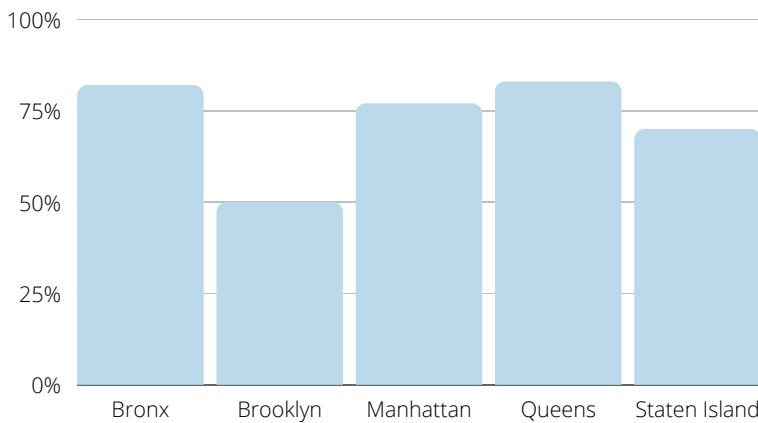

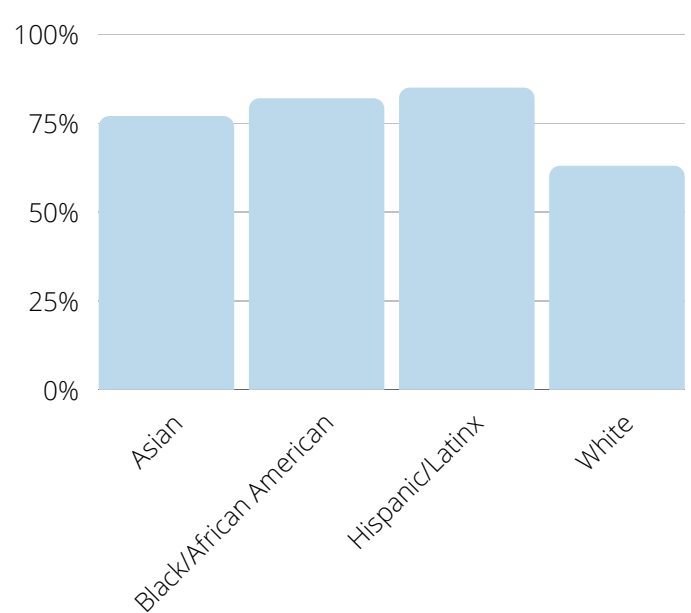
Communities Speak aims to increase the diversity and influence of community voices in policy-making by developing data-driven dialogue between community leaders, constituents and governments.

By Borough

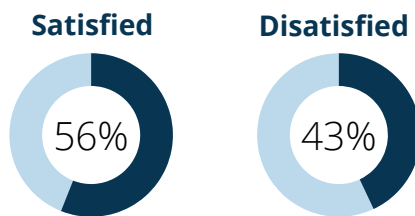

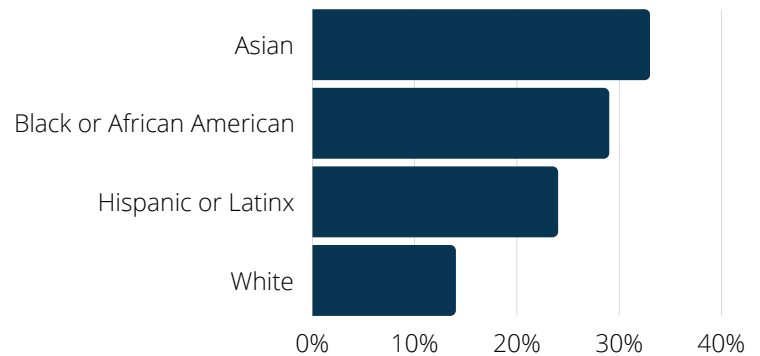
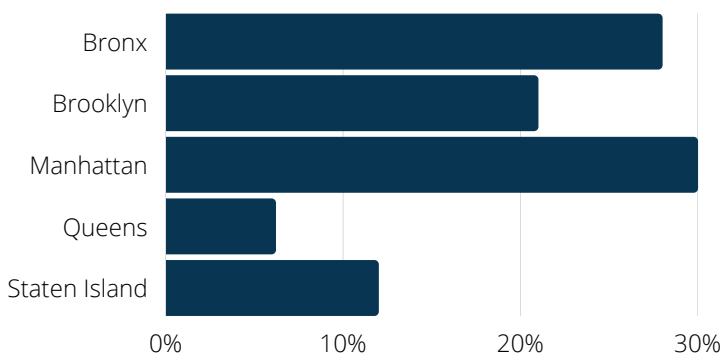
White and Asian respondents demonstrated greater variation in the kind of school their children attended, including more accessibility to private and independent schools.

Dissatisfaction with Child's Public Schooling



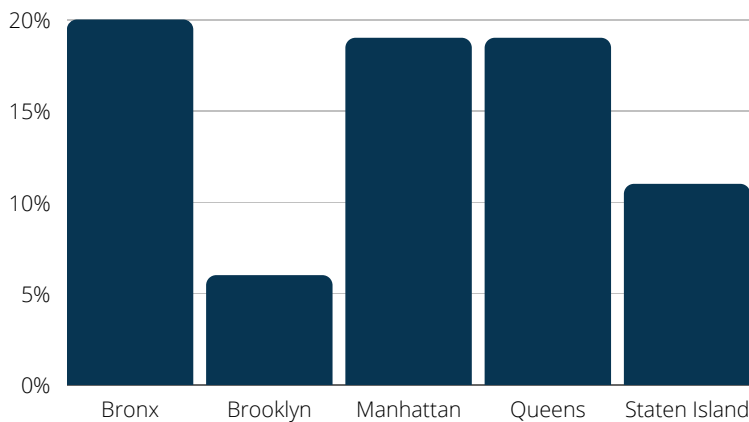
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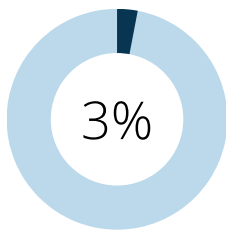
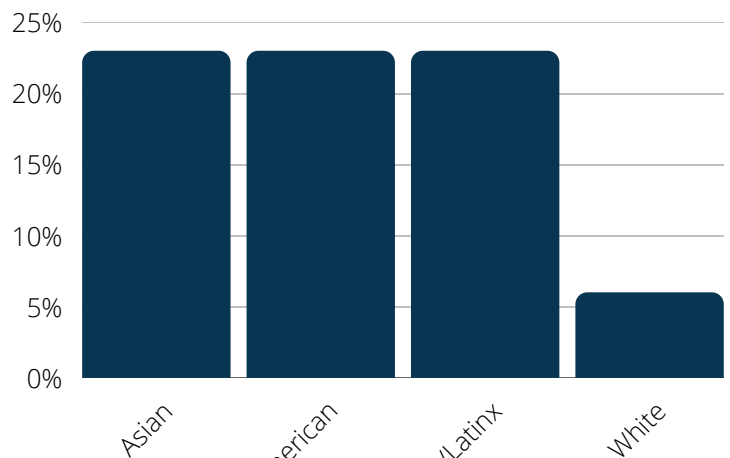

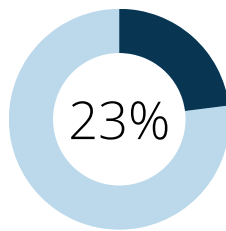

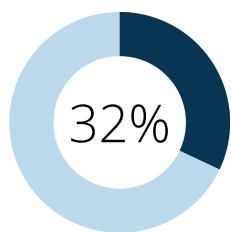

Reason for Changing Schools

Black/African American respondents reported moved their child to a different school predominately because the school was “not meeting their child's *emotional needs*”

White, Hispanic/Latinx, and Asian respondents reported moved their child to a different school predominately because the school was “not meeting their child's *academic needs*”

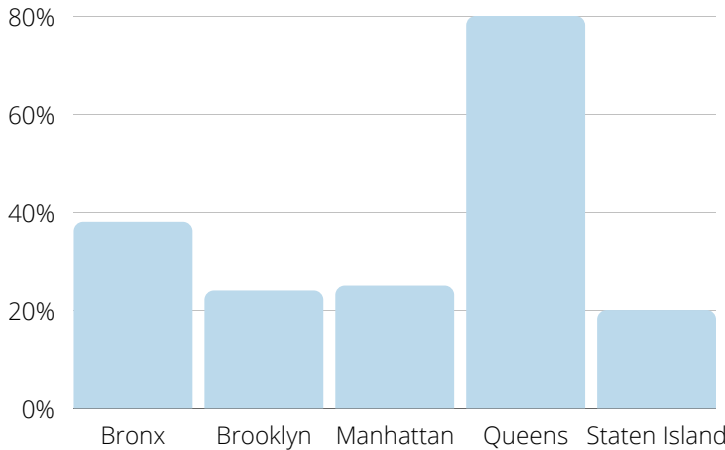


Did not Have Access to Childcare when Needed

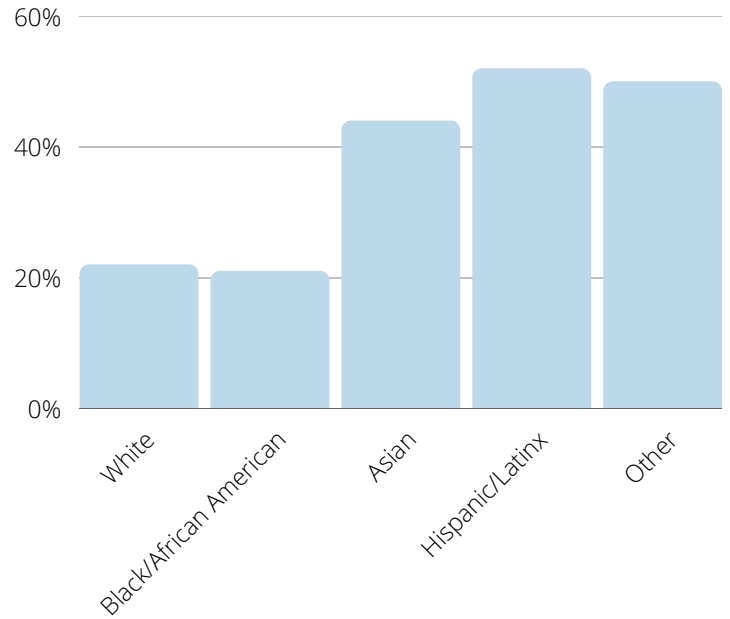

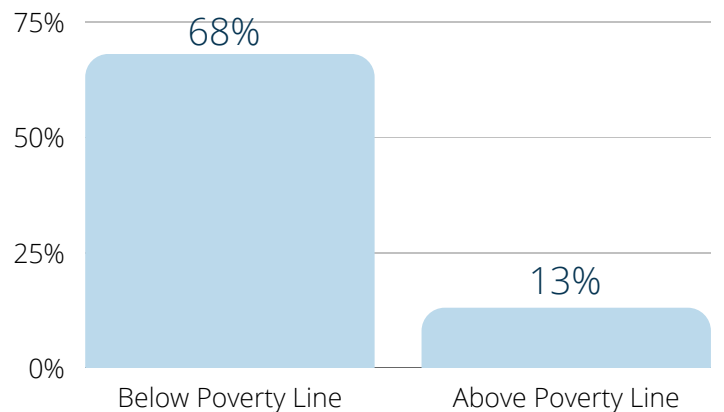
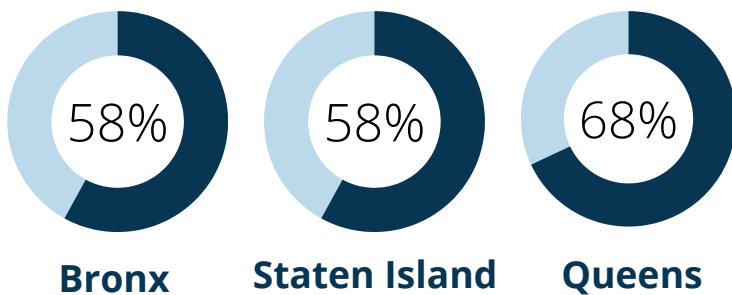
